



Fall Planting

The advantages of fall planting of container liners are many. Growers are able to plant in a period that may otherwise be slow. At the same time they are taking the pressure off of spring when they will be very busy. In most areas, trees are able to settle in and even begin to produce new roots before the cold weather comes. Then when spring comes, they are ready to start growing immediately, not just sit there like spring planted trees. Production time for a saleable plant may be reduced as much as a year. You will notice fewer losses in fall planted material. And your April bill will not be so large.

We still have some of our #3 container liners of Lirodendron, Liquidambar, Taxodium and Magnolia virginiana, and some smaller Styrax japonicus. They're ready to pop in the ground today.
